Florence the Cat

Rescuers from PETA spent days saving animals from the floods after Hurricane Florence. They were about to go home, but they decided to stop and check one last time. It's a good thing they did, because they spotted a skinny cat sitting on the front porch of a flooded house. She had no food, no water to drink, and no way of escaping.



The rescuers named her Florence after the storm that left her stranded. They took her to a vet, who **spayed** her and gave her a check-up. Now Florence is safe and warm and living indoors, where all cats should be.

Sometimes, when dangerous weather hits, people have to leave their homes and go somewhere safe. It's important for them to take their **animal companions** with them because sometimes they can't go back home for a long time. People should make sure they have an emergency plan that includes their animal companions. They can also help cats like Florence by adopting from an animal shelter.

Her future did not look good: Once she and the other cows on the boat got to where they were going, they would be milked until they had no milk left. She didn't want to think about what would happen after that.

Like most cows raised for their milk, Idabelle was **pregnant**. That's the only way a cow can make milk. Just like human moms, cows produce milk for their own babies. Idabelle knew that staying on the boat would lead to disaster for



both herself and her **calf**. She had to do something. So she made her way to the boat's railing, broke through the ropes, and jumped into the James River! Even though she was probably scared, she was able to swim all the way to an island.

Idabelle climbed out of the river and disappeared into the woods. Thankfully, somebody found her and took her to a **sanctuary**, where she gave birth to her calf, who was named Jimmy. She got to spend every day with him, grazing peacefully and taking care of him, just like all mothers want to do. Thanks to her bravery, they would be together for the rest of her life.



Like all animals, cows love their families. Mothers and their babies have a strong **bond**. They lick and groom their calves and even take turns babysitting for each other. Normally, mother cows would spend their whole lives with their babies, but that's not allowed on **dairy** farms.

On dairy farms, baby cows are taken away from their mothers when they're just a day or two old so that their milk can be sold in stores instead of given to them. Cow's milk is for baby cows, just like human milk is for baby humans. Instead of cow's milk, you can enjoy delicious dairy-free versions of foods like macaroni and cheese, pizza, and ice cream.
