Dear Dr. Greene:

Along with a selection of TeachKind materials, including our popular "All About Animals" <u>Bilingual Activity Book</u>, we'd love to send an assortment of empathy-building books including <u>Buddy Unchained</u>, <u>Maverick and Me</u>, <u>Hobbes Goes Home</u>, <u>Junebug: No Life Too Small</u>, and more, for every elementary school in the Yakima district.

As <u>former educators</u>, we know that teaching children the importance of kindness and compassion helps tomorrow's leaders become responsible, critically thinking individuals who consider the wants and needs of all others, not just those who look and behave like them. Your district's <u>commitment to fostering character education</u> in its students is admirable, and we'd be pleased to help enhance your existing programming.
