and you'll help fish on the double.

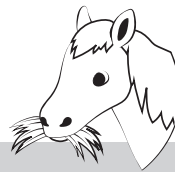
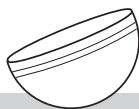
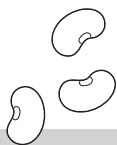
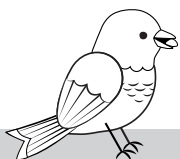
Do your grandparents say, "I'm blind as a bat,"

can you think of better words in their place?

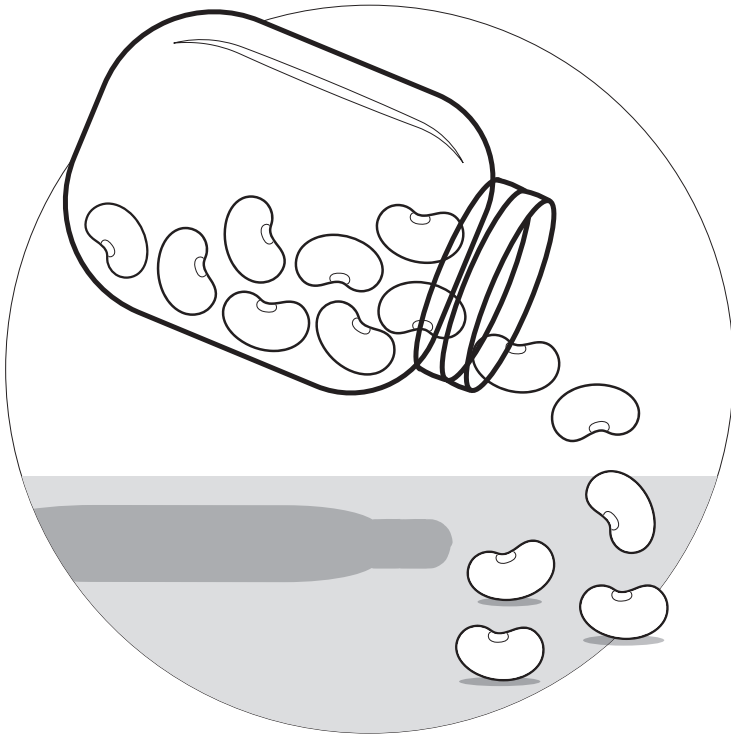




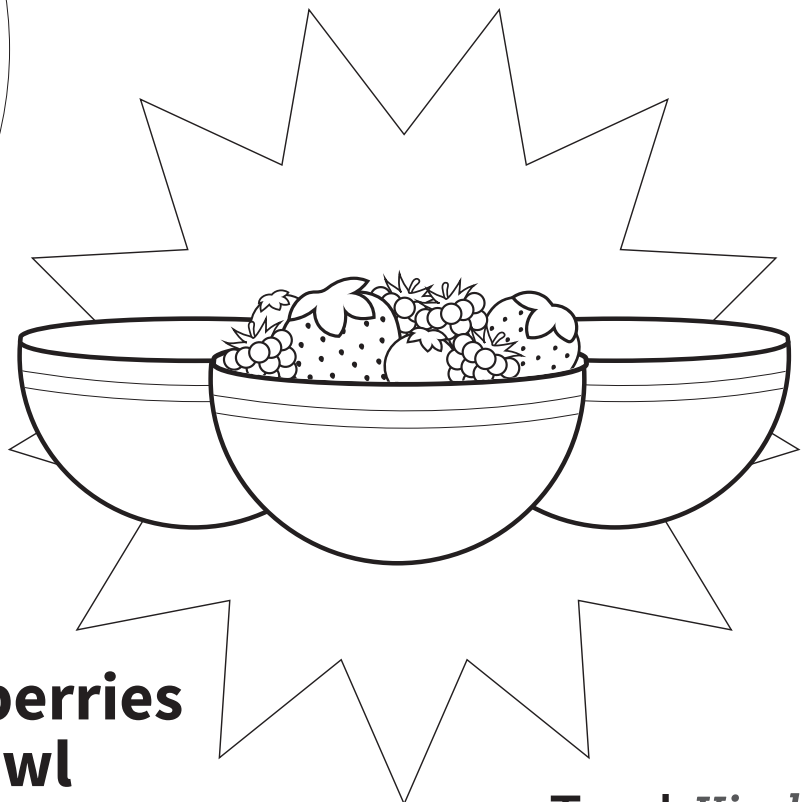
Feed two birds with one scone
